MI Neighborhood 3.0 Policy Update

Program Context 🚳

- New round, separate from MIN 1.0 & 2.0
- Priority: communities with no prior award

Application & Review Timeline III

- Launch: Oct. 6, 2025
- 3 review rounds (Oct–Dec): R1 → Nov Board | R2 → Dec Board | R3 → Jan Board
- Final statewide pool in Jan 2026
- CDBG LOI due 2 weeks after each round; agreements by June 30, 2026

Funding Rules **11**

- Max \$1.5M per agency/project site
- \$100k per new unit; \$45k per rehab unit
- Developer fee: 5% of award or \$5,000 min (profit < \$50k/unit)

Capacity Levels 📊

- Beginner: up to \$500k no match (10% rental owner contrib.)
- Intermediate: up to \$1M 1:1 match after \$500k
- Advanced: up to \$1.5M 1:1 match

Compliance & Restrictions 🎄

- Grants executed within 90 days or rescinded
- No LIHTC, public housing, or full conversions
- Visitability required; insurance mandatory; ACH only
- Local govts & nonprofits only for occupied rehabs

Liens & Legal 📑

- Construction mortgage & note required
- Regulatory agreement required

CEDS Projects and Priorities

► What projects of regional significance are planned or under consideration?

► What are the economic development priorities of our region and its communities?

EDA's Investment Priorities

- Critical Infrastructure: Economic development planning or implementation projects that support development of public facilities, including basic public infrastructure, transportation infrastructure, or telecommunications infrastructure.
- 2. Workforce: Economic Development planning or implementation projects that
 - a. Support job skills training to meet the hiring needs of the area in which the project is to be carried out and that result in wellpaying jobs; or
 - b. Otherwise promote labor force participation.
- 3. Innovation and Entrepreneurship: Economic development planning or implementation projects that
 - a. Support the development of innovation and entrepreneurship-related infrastructure;
 - b. Promote business development and lending; or
 - c. Foster the commercialization of new technologies that are creating technology-driven businesses and high-skilled, well-paying jobs of the future.
- 4. Economic Recovery Resilience: Economic development planning or implementation projects that enhance the ability of an area to withstand and recover from adverse short-term or long-term changes in economic conditions, including effects from industry contractions or economic impacts from natural disasters.
- 5. Manufacturing: Economic development planning or implementation projects that encourage job creation, business expansion, technology and capital upgrades, and productivity growth in manufacturing, including efforts that contribute to the competitiveness and growth of domestic suppliers or the domestic production of innovative, high-value products and production technologies.

Existing CEDS Priorities

- Development of workforce and middle housing that is currently lacking in high demand areas
- Large-scale downtown and waterfront redevelopment projects
- Infrastructure development projects serving the travel, tourism, and outdoor recreation industries
- Creating and maintaining sustainable tourism practices and activities
- Water and sewer infrastructure serving communities and industry, with a high priority on replacement of aging and outdated infrastructure
- Supporting the region's ability to export though the development of infrastructure, facilities, and studies
- Technology and facilities to support telehealth, distance learning, and remote worker development
- Projects that support the growth and expansion of manufacturing facilities
- Development of critical transportation facilities and infrastructure
- Projects that improve the security and efficiency of the region's supply chain
- ► Facilities and programs that support the adoption of the concept of Industry 4.0 and workforce development to meet the region's industry needs
- ► Training for digital economy jobs and the attraction of remote workers
- Investments in workforce development and infrastructure that could support the childcare industry
